LANDMARK DESIGNATION A 'LONG' TIME COMING

J. L. Long Middle School, 6116 Reiger, recently gained Historic Landmark status. The effort began 2 years ago with an ad hoc committee of the Long PTA, comprised of Vickery Place neighbor Beth Bentley, and fellow J. L. Long parents Kaye McCallum and Bob Richie. The committee spent many hours researching the history of the building, and photographing the intricate details and embellishments of the building's façade. Woodrow Wilson High School, which shares a campus with Long, gained both City and State Landmark designation back in 1989. The historic overlay for J.L. Long was first approved by DISD, the City of Dallas Landmark Commission, the City Planning Commission, and finally by Dallas City Council in October 2004. J. L. Long Middle School is a treasure to the East Dallas community and plays a major part in Dallas's educational, architectural and cultural heritage.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF J. L. LONG

As the "junior high" movement swept the nation in the early 1930's, Dallas educators readily embraced the notion, realizing the need for a transitional period between elementary school and high school. J. L. Long was the second Junior High School built in Dallas, opening its doors to students in September of 1933. The enrollment the first year was 550 students.

C.W. Morris was principal for the first 16 years. He thought of the handsome new school as his ship, and he its captain, saying, "we run a tight ship!" Thus came the school's nautical theme—the athletic teams were (and still are today) referred to as the "Buccaneers", the student newspaper was entitled "The Long Log", and the student handbook was known as the "Anchor".



In 1934, students watched as well-known local artist Olin Travis painted the "Food" mural in the school library. It was one of the WPA arts projects produced in Dallas during the Depression. Mr. Travis is also known for two murals he painted in the Hall of State at Fair Park.

John Lawson Long, the school's namesake, was Superintendent of Dallas schools at the turn of the 20th century. He made many contributions to the Dallas Educational System and helped lay the foundation for the Dallas School District. Mr. Long died in June 1933. The Dallas School Board seeking to honor his memory choose to name the new Junior High School in his honor. Mr. Long's resolve to provide students with a classical education, as well as build strong character, continues on today.

MEET THE BOARD – ANGI BROWN

Goodwin Avenue neighbor Angi Brown has lived in Vickery Place with her partner, Leslie Farrell, for a little over five years. Although this year is her first to serve on the VPNA board, she has been active for several years as a volunteer for the National Night Out Block Party and working on the committee to promote the conservation district designation, seeking to preserve the character of Vickery Place neighborhood. Angi is not a native of Texas, but originally from the Midwest. Before moving to the Lone Star State, she lived in Denver Colorado, Dover New Jersey, Los Angeles California and Chicago Illinois. Her career in marketing and product development for cable television, telephone and high-speed Internet services gave her a great opportunity to travel and eventually brought her to Dallas. Most recently she has made a radical change in vocation and returned to school fulltime, attending Brite Divinity School (TCU) in Fort Worth. In addition to studying, Angi is currently working for a unique United Methodist mission, a community of artists called ArtSpirit which engages, explores and interprets the mysteries of God and spirituality through the arts (www.artspiritdallas.org). Angi also serves as a board member for The Open Door Preschool at Grace United Methodist Church which teaches language skills to preschoolers who primarily come from low income, non-English speaking families. Much of her spare time is spent on house renovations for one of the neighborhood's original bungalows. She and Leslie courageously tackle most projects themselves. "It's been great fun working with this year's board and getting to know our community better. I've made some good friends and that makes living in our lovely neighborhood even better!"

EATING SOLO?

Slaving over a hot stove only to eat alone always seems like too much work, especially around the holidays. If you'll be dining solo this year, our single serving menus can help you have a stress-free and satisfying dinner, without unwanted leftovers!

Difficulty: Medium

Prep Time: 20 minutes

Cook Time: 25 minutes

Yield: 2 to 3 servings

2 tablespoons unsalted butter
1/2 tablespoon all-purpose flour
1/2 cup beef broth
1 (1/2 pound) piece beef tenderloin, trimmed, sliced
1/4 inch thick, then cut into 1-inch pieces
1 tablespoon olive oil
1/4 cup thinly sliced shallot
1/2 pound creminis, trimmed and halved (quartered, if large)
2 tablespoons sour cream, at room temperature
1/2 teaspoon Dijon mustard
1 tablespoon chopped fresh dill
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/8 teaspoon black pepper
Accompaniment: buttered cooked wide egg noodles

Melt 1 tablespoon butter in a small heavy saucepan over moderate heat and whisk in flour, then cook roux, whisking constantly, 2 minutes. Add broth in a slow stream, whisking constantly, and bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer, whisking occasionally, 3 minutes. Remove from heat and keep warm. Pat beef dry and season well with salt and pepper. Heat 1/2 tablespoon butter with 1/2 tablespoon oil in a 12-inch heavy skillet over moderately high heat until foam subsides. Saute beef turning once, until browned on both sides but still pink inside, about 1 minute. Transfer to a plate with a slotted spoon.

Heat remaining 1/2 tablespoon butter with remaining 1/2 tablespoon oil in same skillet over moderately high heat until hot but not smoking, then saute shallot, stirring occasionally, until golden brown, about 3 minutes. Add mushrooms and saute, stirring occasionally, until the liquid mushrooms give off is evaporated and mushrooms are browned, about 8 to 10 minutes. Return meat with its juices to skillet, stir to combine, and then transfer to a platter.

Reheat sauce over low heat (do not let boil), then whisk in sour cream, mustard, dill, salt, and pepper. Pour sauce over beef and serve immediately. *(Recipe from FoodNetwork.com)*

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Vickery Place Frequently Asked Questions

Whether you are a veteran to Vickery Place or have just moved in here are some frequently asked questions and answers to help you out.



- **Who is responsible for fixing the sidewalk in front of my house?**
 - The homeowner is responsible for maintaining the condition of the sidewalk in front of their house. Under rare circumstances the City will share the cost of repairing the sidewalk. However this shared cost may be more expensive than hiring an independent contractor yourself.
- **Who is responsible for maintaining the alley behind my house?**
 - The homeowner is responsible for maintaining the alley directly behind their house and making sure it is free of litter and debris.
- **How can I get the alley behind my house paved?**
 - The City of Dallas requires that home owners share the costs of improving an unpaved alley. A petition has to be signed by 2/3rds of the residents whose houses share the alley. To start this process you can either call 311 or fill out the online form at <http://311.dallascityhall.com/index.html> Be sure to choose the Service Request Entry - Paving - Unimproved (New Alley) - PWT
- **How can I get part of my block designated as NO PARKING?**
 - By City of Dallas ordinance, "No Parking" signs are handled on a petition basis. In a residential area, the citizen must have a petition signed by 80% of affected citizens in the same block, on the same side of the street, with 51% being in favor of the change. There is a \$50 non-refundable application fee and a fee of \$25 per sign installed/removed. - **Who can I contact regarding suspicious activities?**
 - Always call 911 if something seems suspicious around our neighborhood. Having a patrol car drive by might just prevent a crime. Additionally, you can contact our dedicated ICP officers at 214-670-4420. to alert them of suspected regular illegal activities being conducted out of a particular residence.
- **Who can I contact regarding Dallas City code violations? Ex. Bulky trash out at an improper time, cars in the yard, too many garage sales, junk cars, etc...**
